

Artsource is an exemplary membership and advocacy body for visual artists in Western Australia, that inspires, expands and improves the profile and sustainability of artists and the sector.

Our Purpose

Artsource delivers high quality, core services on behalf of individual artist members and the visual arts sector, in partnership with stakeholders.

Our Members

n 2008 the overall number of memberships rose from 790 to 893. The volume of the members' activity and the quality of the artists' work is a clear demonstration of the energy, skill and commitment to practice of visual artists in Western Australia.

138 of our members exhibited their work, 59 members achieved various grants and awards, while 41 achieved public art commissions. 11 artists won residencies at state, national and international venues.

The knowledge and capacity of these artists is an extraordinary resource, and on their behalf, the staff and Board of Artsource seek to understand their needs and respond effectively to individual and sector issues.

A rtsource assists its members through three tiers of membership – each one designed to best fit their varied needs.

ACCESS provides visual arts information, support, networking, professional development, advocacy, membership voting rights and access to resources and discounts.

PLUS membership provides real income earning opportunities and a continual profile on our online Artist Database on top of the ACCESS benefits.

MAX adds \$10million public liability insurance and free workshops to the full package of ACCESS and PLUS benefits.

Our programs

We support members principally through professional development services and by channelling opportunities. These are delivered through our three main program areas:

- Employment Agency + Art Consultancy
- Studios + Residencies
- Regional + Indigenous Development

Members receive regular communications via electronic messages containing information about jobs, opportunities, workshops, funding, exhibitions and events, as well as our quarterly newsletter.

The activities of our members are promoted through our website, online Artist Database, regular publications, consultancy and numerous presentations to clients, both public and private sector. In this way we are able to share specialist knowledge and promote best practice principles in the commissioning of artwork, working with artists and the role of art in our society.



Report from the Chair

Graeme Rowley

s I review the activities of our organisation throughout 2008, I am pleased to report substantial benefit to our members. The best measure of the effectiveness of membership based organisations such as Artsource is through the number of quality members attained and retained. Consequently, I am pleased to report that our membership increased by 13% to 893 members in this past year.

Artsource is a small organisation with big dreams for artists in Western Australia and the health of the sector as a whole. We not only recognise the enormous benefits that our artists bring to Western Australia's culture, but we believe that artists in this state have the capacity to reach far beyond our state and national boundaries.

In 2008, we began developing new relationships with private philanthropists in order to develop a fund that will enable many WA artists to travel, to take up short term residencies in other countries and to learn more about their chosen field of endeavour. The Board is committed to this vision and we believe that the results of the residencies which this Fund enables will enrich our State for many years into the future. We will be offering the first of a series of new international residencies in 2009.

We not only encourage and nurture opportunities for a broader experience for our artists, but also recognise the clear need for real assistance for the Indigenous and regionally based artists who have the ability to tell another and significant story about our state. Australia takes great pride in the Indigenous art and culture of this country, and yet as a nation we struggle to effectively support, nurture and develop those art practices. Artsource believes that it is incumbent upon all of us to address the real infrastructure issues that challenge our artists' aspirations, and will continue to work on this through our Regional and Indigenous Program.

Western Australia has been through a significant growth period and this has had benefits for many artists. In the current time of market contraction, we need to work even more vigorously to advance the capacity of our artists. We aspire to not only match the number and value of art commissions valued at \$6.8million in 2008, but to advocate astutely for braver artwork commissions for the public arena – for artwork that tells us who we wish to be as well as who we are.

These are the tasks that Artsource takes on with vigour and intelligence. The work of our artist members and of Artsource is significant in that it speaks to enduring values. As an organisation, we are committed to advancing the profile and capacity of Western Australian artists and I believe our organisation does that very well. ⁽²⁾

Report from the Executive Director

key element of our work in 2008 focussed on development and advocacy. We continued to explore every avenue we could to find and develop affordable studio spaces for our members. In a tough economic climate where rents were high and space in demand, this has been challenging.

With support from the City of Fremantle, we were able to utilise a heritage cottage in Fremantle for housing international, national and regional artists. We were delighted that in its first year of operation, the space broke even and we housed two international artists and nine regional artists for short and medium term stays.

Many of our members expressed concern that studio space in the CBD had dwindled to almost nothing. Therefore we also began work with the City of Perth to develop longer term spaces in the CBD. An initial offer of the Old Gasworks on Wellington Street for long term lease is hitting the usual hurdles that old buildings face, however, we continue to work on the issue.

Our Employment Agency continues to advocate for our members through tailored presentations to clients showing work from the range of our PLUS and MAX members and facilitating access to opportunities, 333 of which were circulated in 2008. The new Art Lease service found its feet with a return of over \$50,000 in lease payments to 56 artists achieved.

A new initiative in 2008 saw Artsource presenting the work of senior artists specialising in public art to an international market through our project called *artConnect – Australian artists for public spaces*. Through an awareness raising and advocacy development project we made two visits to Singapore and Dubai this year and presented to around 100 individuals and companies resulting in an extensive network of over 150 people. We will continue this work over the next three years.



Our Regional and Indigenous Program continued to make inroads into new communities and to develop relationships with a significant number of artists living in isolated regional communities, enabling them to connect with the informed advice and network support supplied by our team. A valuable partnership arrangement with Rio Tinto in the Pilbara has enabled us to continue to provide services to artists and organisations in that region.

A great pleasure for us earlier in 2008 was to successfully nominate Tony Jones as WA Citizen of the Year for his services to art and culture. The waves of enthusiasm for Tony, and his positive support for art and artists in WA, threatened to overwhelm our systems at one point.

As always, our objectives are more easily met through the extraordinary talent of our Staff and commitment of our Board. I remain in awe of the skill and intelligence brought to our activities and development each year. ^O

Residency Fund

Integral to the development of nearly all art practice is an understanding and experience of a wider world.

n order to nourish artists' development and their further contribution to our communities Artsource is raising \$2million to enable artists to spread their wings.

Through a program of international, national and country WA residencies over the next 10 years WA's most talented, emerging and established artists will be able to travel the world and return to share their experiences back home.

Integral to the development of nearly all art practice is an understanding and experience of a wider world. Perth is the most isolated capital city in the world and our country areas are even more isolated. For artists, the need to travel periodically to gain external stimulus, inspiration and to connect with the wider arts world is imperative. Residencies feed an art practice as well as the artists; and consequently the benefits and influence flow on to the community at large.

The residency program will facilitate the exchange of artists in and out of Western Australia (metro and country) with the intention of promoting:

- Interaction and engagement between
 different communities and cultures
- Sharing and development of skills between artists and communities
- Professional development for artists
- Great art

In 2008, Artsource launched this ambitious fundraising scheme to turn the residency dream into reality. Three functions were held, hosted by corporate partners or supporters and thanks to our 26 individual donors a total of \$48,365 was raised - a significant start to our target, with donations ranging from \$50 to \$10,000.

From this total, we have already announced one new residency of \$20,000 to be selected in 2009. By deliberately keeping the criteria as open as possible, Artsource is expanding residency options currently on offer - the artists are invited to apply for a residency that best meets their need for professional development, networking, participation in a key event or for pure inspiration.

As donations grow, more residencies will be added progressively. The overall objective of the residency program is to facilitate the following activity every year for the next 10 years:

- 10-12 each year to interstate or international
- 10-12 each year to country WA
- Accommodation to host 6-8 visiting artists each year
- 250 artists or more will benefit from the Artsource Residency Fund. ^O

artConnect

Our task over the next three years is to continue to develop relationships and to gain significant commissions for Australian artists.

he artConnect initiative began as an advocacy and development project because we consider that the 'public art' undertaken by Australian artists is second to none and we believed there are real opportunities for our artists to be engaged on projects in other parts of the world.

Our proposition that our artists do measure up has already been proved to our satisfaction and our task over the next three years is to continue to develop relationships and to gain significant commissions for Australian artists. We are delighted to announce that the Australia Council will continue to support this initiative.

Artists have benefited measurably from the long term State Government Percent for Art Policy as well as similar policies recently adopted by Redevelopment Authorities and Local Government. This has developed and honed their skills in creating artworks of sufficient scale to impact public environments. The initial group of artists chosen to join the project were:

Geoffrey Drake Brockman, Stuart Green, Nigel Helyer, Tony Jones, Richie Kuhaupt, Coral Lowry, Matthew Ngui, Philippa O'Brien and Jon Tarry.

Each of the artists made a financial investment in the project and undertook to advocate on behalf of the others where appropriate.

We targeted countries where there was an international vernacular in the built form, existing relationships with other design professionals, where there was considerable structural development and where contracts are typically in English.

In 2008 we made two trips to Singapore and to the United Arab Emirates, focusing on Dubai. We were fortunate to gain significant assistance from the Australian Trade Commission (Austrade) as well as support from architectural, construction and property development companies including Hassell, Hawaiian Group and Mirvac with promotional support from the Australia Business Arts Foundation.

We have now developed an international network of architects, landscape designers, planners, government agencies and arts organisations and have been invited to participate in four tenders in the United Arab Emirates – a mix of art consultancy, master planning and project coordination work. The flow on for Australian artists should any one of these be successful can be measured in the millions of dollars.

In 2008, with financial assistance from the Australia Council, Artsource was able to test the water of generating real employment opportunities for Australian artists in an international market.

omplementing our public art consultancy service, Artsource's ArtLease/BuyArt service provides advice and assistance to clients seeking artworks for their interior spaces.

Leasing artworks offers artists an alternative source of income for artworks that are lying dormant. By providing a service which meets both client and member needs, Artsource achieves its objective of increasing the profile of Western Australian artists, in this case in a variety of workplaces across the city.

With a database of our members' artworks that are available for purchase or lease and strong relationships with artists' representatives, Artsource is uniquely positioned to find artworks to meet each client's specific needs.


Relationships with existing leasing clients were strengthened in 2008 with existing leases being renewed and additional assistance sought for collection management and leasing of supplementary works. Seven new client relationships were established this year including state government agencies, local government and the private sector companies. This activity resulted in 83 artworks valued at \$280,000 being installed in 9 sites across Perth generating over \$50,000 in income for the artists involved.

Works available for lease meet a particular market need. Many organisations seek to obtain artworks for their premises but some wish to avoid the permanent ownership of artworks for a number of identified reasons. These include the cost of outright purchase, an unsuitable length of lease on their accommodation, the intended short term nature of their operations or the desire to regularly refresh their interior design scheme.

We are planning the growth of the ArtLease/ BuyArt service in 2009 by increasing our retention and attraction of clients, as well as the number of members participating in the program; with particular focus on improving the participation of Indigenous members. Focus will be placed on opportunities presented to us by Interior Designers, by forging more relationships and assisting them in the sourcing of appropriate artworks for their specialist clients in addition to our own. ^O

Regional + Indigenous Program

Essential to Artsource's approach are considerations of respect and recognition of culture and the support of cultural priorities and protocols set by the Indigenous communities within which we work.

rtsource's Regional + Indigenous Program was developed in 2003 in response to the large and increasing gap between the capacity of artists living and working in regional WA to access professional and skills development support and assistance.

Fundamental to the program's reach and success has been the employment of Indigenous coordinators and managers to develop and implement it. It has also been very important internally for Artsource as we have gained immeasurably from the generous cultural sharing of our Indigenous employees.

The Artsource Regional + Indigenous Program has created a new pathway for Indigenous artists in understanding of and access to the support networks for visual artists in Australia.

The Indigenous program has a clear link to our Employment Agency and Studio Programs through the development of income generating opportunities for member artists and the possibility for gaining an Artsource studio. Currently enjoying studio spaces provided by Artsource are Laurel Nannup, Toogarr Morrison and Bevan Thompson.

2008 saw the appointment of Ron Bradfield Jnr to the position of Manager of this program following Glenn Pilkington's excellent groundwork.

We built on work undertaken in 2007 with Pilbara Iron Ore and developed a three year partnership project with Rio Tinto for delivery of a sustained professional development program to the West Pilbara.

In a very real sense the ideal outcome of our work in regional WA would be that a metropolitan based organisation is no longer necessary for the health of local arts communities.

However, it is clear, and has been reinforced by our regional steering committee, that regions share many of the same issues relating to poor or non existent support networks and infrastructure and that these problems are not going away any time soon. Artsource continues to provide the important centralized network.

In particular the lack of affordable working space, studios and exhibition spaces impact on the capacity of regional and Indigenous artists to produce and show their best work.

Workshop Program

Preparation, consultation, research and implementation of our annual workshop program resulted in delivery of nine workshops in five regions reaching 228 artists.

Three Make Time to Talk (Relationships Australia) Skills Development workshops across three towns in the Midwest: Horrocks Beach. Geraldton and Mullewa. These were delivered over the course of four days, and addressed 42 artists (both Indigenous and non-Indigenous) from towns including Kalbarri, Horrocks, Northampton, Geraldton, Yalgoo, Mullewa and Morawa. Lesley Munro (artist) was the guest presenter, sharing her knowledge of using different paint mediums, application techniques and canvas use.

We were able to support Arts Law Centre of Australia in a week long workshop which saw the Centre assist numerous Indigenous artists in the Pilbara to both understand the importance of making a will and how to make one.

Support for Indigenous artists

Specific needs of individuals are addressed and one to one consultancy provided, as well as workshop based learning.

We worked closely with 67 regional and metropolitan Indigenous artists providing advice and assistance with development of their professional practice.

Wayne Stevens is a Pilbara based artist working out of both Karratha and Tom Price. Wayne has learned to carve traditional wooden artefacts from his father and the quality of his practice sees his works very much in demand in the Mining and Resource Industry arena. Wayne is working with Artsource to develop further opportunity outside of this area – and as a result Wayne has met with commercial gallery owners, met successful Indigenous artists, developed a profile and is working towards a website and glossy brochure to promote his artworks further afield.

Regional artists

The program seeks to connect with all artists operating in the regional areas as they often feel isolated, and ill informed about issues affecting the arts across WA and Australia.

In 2008 Artsource invited Ric Spencer (Arts writer for *The West Australian*), Janis Nedela (Gallery East), and Helen Clark (printmaker and arts lecturer) to engage over 30 Midwest artists in a discussion about establishing a working relationship with art galleries, in order to further their artistic opportunities. Over the course of three days Artsource members also had the opportunity to engage both Ric and Janis in individual studio visits, with the aim of seeking critical feedback on their current art practice to further pursue wider opportunities available to them in WA or further afield.

WA Premier's Indigenous Art Awards

Artsource assisted with the nomination of over 14 artists including the development of all their relevant support material including interpretation and digital photography, across the metro area and regional WA for this important inaugural award.

Artists included Lance Chadd, Toogarr Morrison, Laurel Nannup, Peter Farmer, Bruce Bradfield, Cassandra Burton, Bevan Thompson, Francine Riches, Jilalga Murray-Ranui, Helen Muir-Richardson, Sharyn Egan, Loretta Egan, Jason Dimer, and Naomi Grant. Many other artists from regional Western Australia also enquired, and these were referred to their relevant representative bodies or art centres (i.e. Roebourne Artist Group, Yinjaa Barni Art Centre, Mungart Boodja, Marra Aboriginal Corporation etc).

The Mid West Region

We were also fortunate in having Sonja Parmenter based in Geraldton working for us on a part time basis. This was made possible through the Regional Arts Fund managed by Country Arts WA. Sonja's knowledge and experience has proven invaluable to artists in the Mid West Region and has ensured that those artists had access to high quality professional development workshops, studio visits by gallery directors and critics and skills development workshops ranging through the whole Mid West.



SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Artsource has been able to deliver skills development workshops for many regional communities through annual project funding through Healthway supporting the Relationships Australia message 'Make Time to Talk'. This has been a great message for us and a perfect fit for the work we do enabling artists to develop and to access the networks that support them.

STAFF CONTRIBUTIONS

Our priority is to work with individual artists assisting them to a more sustainable future. In addition our staff make significant contributions to policy development, community based organisations, public institutions and Indigenous art centres through support and advice, written submissions, understanding and access to other developed networks and practical assistance in terms of funding applications.

FUNDING AND PROGRAM SUPPORT

Artsource has been fortunate to achieve considerable funding support from sources to enable this program to survive. Investment has come from the Department of Culture and the Arts, Department of Local Government and Regional Development, Regional Arts Fund through Country Arts WA, Regional Partnerships through the Department of Transport and Regional Services, Rio Tinto and Pilbara Iron Ore and Healthway through Relationships Australia.

And in particular we would like to thank Marra Indigenous Arts (now trading as Yamaji Arts), Mungart Boodja Art Centre, Roebourne Art Group and the Yinjaa Barni Art Centre. 🖸

Studios

At the heart of the matter artists need space for inspiration, contemplation and realisation of their ideas and for this they need a studio.

key strategy this year was to build continuing awareness in the arts sector and in the broader community of the need for studio spaces and of Artsource's commitment to sourcing and managing such spaces. In addition, identifying potential partners, both government and corporate, and initiatives for securing or attracting such partners was also deemed essential.

In a year when metropolitan Perth lost five studio complexes, each with 5-10 artists in them (Burt Street, Palm Court, the Ballroom, Ginger's Garage and Free Range Gallery) the demand for long term, affordable, secure, studio spaces increased further. Not only were we receiving enquiries from the newer artists, but also from well established artists who had been evicted from their studio and were desperate to find an alternative space so they could continue working.

To track demand, we instigated an active and targeted research process which will provide an accurate reflection of the current demand across practice, location, cost and size. This research process will reach completion in early 2009 and produce much needed statistics in support of broader lobbying for improved infrastructure resources across the arts sector.


In 2008 Artsource managed eight different studio complexes across the Perth metropolitan

area in locations as varied as Kelmscott, Churchlands, East Perth, Belmont, East Fremantle, City Beach, and Fremantle. This includes a new space in Amherst Street, a 67sqm shed located in an industrial area in East Fremantle. Tenants in the 46 studios included ceramicists, painters, installation artists, digital artists, printmakers, sculptors, fibre textile artists, public artists, graffiti artists, interdisciplinary artists, photographers, an artists' society, writers, several circus organisations and a contemporary music organisation.

One very public studio project in 2008 took off with the announcement mid-year that the Old Gasworks building in Wellington Street was being leased to Artsource by the City of Perth to develop a range of affordable studio spaces. However the release of an architect's report (commissioned by the City of Perth) revealed a number of serious safety concerns in the building and brought with it a huge budget estimate to address the issues. With infrastructure investments of this scale seriously impacted by the recent economic downturn, progress on this initiative inevitably slowed down. In 2009 Artsource will work closely with the City of Perth to determine a way forward that ensures this vital opportunity for artists and for the inner city is not lost.

Our longest running studio venue (22 years), Old Customs House in Fremantle, was opened to the public in October 2008. Arts patron Diana



Warnock welcomed 150 invited guests, on the Thursday evening, and encouraged them to chat with artists and sneak a peek inside their working spaces whilst viewing the art installations throughout the corridors of the heritage building. On the Sunday afternoon, another 150 Fremantle visitors and tourists were able to meander around the studios, clearly enjoying and appreciating the experience. This is an annual event; it is a unique opportunity to talk to artists in their 'making space' and gain an insight into some of the process of an arts practice.

In 2009 we will also focus on establishing our first industrial studio spaces in the metro area and investigate several possibilities for setting up studio spaces in a couple of regional centres.

The appointment of Sophia Hall to the position of Manager, Studios + Residencies in late 2008 has broadened our capacity to service and implement these strategies and to respond with immediacy and alacrity to opportunities across both programs.

Continuing to build on the success of existing spaces and relationships, achieving an accurate picture of the demand for space, and responding to and pursuing new opportunities and partnerships will be our ongoing focus. In this way Artsource believes we can effectively achieve an increasing and diverse range of studio spaces for Western Australian visual artists.

In 2008 Artsource managed eight different studio complexes across the Perth metropolitan area. Residencies

Expanding horizons, building new relationships and exploring other approaches to art practice bring vitality and depth to an artist's work and enrich their contribution to and relationship with their peers and their community.

esidencies inherently create and nurture skills exchange, mutually beneficial artistic relationships and new networks for creating and promoting work for both the visiting artist and for the local artists.

In partnership with the City of Fremantle and the Department of Building Maintenance and Works, Artsource became the landlord of a cottage in Henderson Street, Fremantle (alongside the Fremantle Markets). The cottage is used as a new residency space to host visiting artists. Following this launch we undertook a targeted and strategic approach to publicise this residency both nationally and internationally. By the end of 2008 the Henderson Street cottage was booked by Western Australian and international artists right through to 2010, complementing perfectly the existing Residential Studio at Old Customs House.

Artsource promotes and coordinates regional residencies around Western Australia. This provides a central location for artists to access a range of residency opportunities; and promotes the residencies to around 900 artist members. These residencies now include Greenough, Albany (the Vancouver Arts Centre), Beverley, Esperance, Moora and Lesmurdie; as well as the studio residencies hosted by Guildford Grammar School and Ellenbrook. Free accommodation is provided with these residencies and artists can apply to spend time in any of the locations and interact with the local communities.

In 2008 Artsource again sent artists to Sydney and Basel and welcomed artists from South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria, the Kimberley, Pilbara, and Gascoyne regions, England and Scotland. Between the newly established Henderson Street Residency Cottage and the Old Customs House Residential Studio, over 30 artists were hosted with artforms ranging from illustration, painting, photography, theatre, installations, interdisciplinary practice, sculpture, writing, sound arts, dance and digital multimedia.

Koral and Stripe, *Poets of the Machine*, took advantage of their Basel residency by exhibiting in the residency space and through other exhibition and gallery spaces in Switzerland. They also participated in a number of large art projects and are hoping to head back to Basel in the near future. The work they developed during the residency was imaginatively evocative of their experience of living and working in Switzerland.

Similarly Bennett Miller took advantage of his residency at the Gunnery in Sydney to begin work on a series that had been germinating for some time but which was facilitated in its development by the residency location on the Eastern seaboard. Bennett has exhibitions lined up in Victoria and New South Wales following his residency.

As part of our exchange partnership with the Christoph Merian Foundation in Switzerland, Swiss artists Peter Spillman and Susanne Schaer stayed in the Old Customs House accommodation for their six month residency. Peter and Susanne were attracted to the Fremantle residency because of the huge studio space that came with the accommodation (90sqm); a luxury unheard of in Basel. They were a collaborative team who spent their time incorporating the existing furniture and found materials into various installations in the studio space and producing videos of the process.

Artsource has a long term vision to expand its Residencies Program so that an abundance of residencies can be offered which are artist inspired and designed, which are broad and unlimited in their conception and which develop practice in whatever form that takes. Their installations and videos reflected their engagement with their temporary 'home' and with the peculiarities of Fremantle.

The Artsource Residency Program is on the cusp of significant growth over the next couple of years. Building opportunity and resources for Western Australian artists to undertake residencies elsewhere has taken a much needed focus. Artsource has had a long term vision to expand our Residencies Program so that we can offer an abundance of residencies which are artist inspired and designed, which are broad and unlimited in their conception and which develop their practice in whatever form that takes. To make this happen, Artsource established the Residency Fund in 2008 (see page 7) to support a residency program which encompasses Australian and international residencies for Western Australian artists, country WA residencies for Western Australian artists, and visiting artists accommodation in Western Australia.

2009 will see the announcement of at least one new artist initiated residency with proposals invited from Western Australian visual artists. Developing the capacity amongst Western Australian artists to take advantage of this program which enables them to go "wherever they want for whatever they want" will be key to the success of this groundbreaking initiative. **O**

Employment Agency

Originally set up in response to the growth of public art through the State Government Percent for Art Scheme, our Employment Agency was established to increase the professional opportunities for artists.

ver the last 12 years Artsource Employment Agency has become the pre-eminent resource for clients looking to engage artists and for artists seeking employment opportunities in Western Australia. The diversity of employment opportunities has become more apparent over time and now artists are sought for a broad range of commissions, consultancy, advice, teaching, residencies, leasing and general purchase of work through the Employment Agency.

As a matching service for artists and clients the Agency channels real jobs and income to Artsource PLUS and MAX members. In 2008 Artsource filtered employment opportunities valued at over \$6.8million to Western Australian artists and represented 577 artists.

The statistics collected by the Employment Agency provide a valuable resource for determining the health of the sector and allow us to gauge the finer details, nature and value of employment opportunities to visual artists. The data monitoring of these statistics is a fundamental role for the Employment Agency team and provides a broad overview of the activity within the sector.

The number and total value of opportunities circulated to our PLUS and MAX members have continued to rise through 2008 with a total of 333 opportunities circulated, up from 290 in 2007. Overall, commissions were valued at \$6.8million, of which \$1.4million consisted of State Government Percent for Art jobs.

The number and value of State Government Percent for Art commissions dropped from 27 in 2007 to 13 in 2008 due primarily to the transition period as the new government settled and its planning stages of new infrastructure projects. The outlook for 2009 appears strong as the State Government commits to infrastructure projects.

In line with our goal to profile Western Australian artists internationally in 2008, a growing number of selected international opportunities were circulated, for commissions valued over \$500,000.

The concentrated work by Artsource on developing *Percent for Art Policy for Local Government* over the last two years has led to an increase in commissioning of works, and remains one of the largest employers of artists with 23 projects in 2008. Commissions through other bodies remained steady or showed slight increases, most notably with the number of private client commissions rising from 21 in 2007 to 33 in 2008. The average value of commissions showed a slight increase in 2008 to \$72,000 per project.

The constant stream of employment opportunities are delivered directly to members electronically via our "+mail". The 43 "+mails" sent in 2008 included commissions in public and Percent for Art projects, purchases, contract work, residencies, teaching and other employment.


72 clients chose to take out an annual subscription to access Artsource services on a regular basis for specialised commissions and to develop projects through Artsource's consultancy services. Regular clients include Local Government, Redevelopment Authorities, developers, architects, landscape architects, urban and interior designers, town planners and individuals. Subscribing offers a broad range of services at a reasonable rate which is often preferable to paying one-off fees. ^(C)



Top Olga Cironis, *Behind Each Look* Above Christopher Young, *Untitled*, 1600mm x 980mm, 2007/08 rtsource consultancy comprises of two key areas; *outdoor* art addressing public art, commissions, policy and planning and *indoor* art through our *ArtLease/BuyArt* service (see p 9). Both activities provide Artsource with resources and funds to subsidise artist membership, representation and promotion.

To ensure that our knowledge of the market remains current we undertake a limited number of projects annually, including small and large scale, public and private work ranging from general advice on art matters to complete project coordination, public art policy development and community consultation.

Artsource has invested considerably towards promoting the Percent for Art Policy template developed in 2007 specifically for Local Government. Specific presentations and consultancy on the template were delivered to the Shires of Busselton, Bunbury, Roebourne, Ashburton, Victoria Park, and the City of Swan this year.

To complement this activity several public art projects were undertaken. The Brownlie Towers' project offered four photographers, Christopher Young, Andrew Pritchard, Florence Alain and Margaret Dillon an opportunity to present works permanently within the residential complex. The project was achieved with the support of Morley Davis Architects, Steve Collett from Aluimage and the Department of Housing and Works.

Artsource consultancy is engaged to assist and to facilitate artist selection. We believe that early engagement in the project development

The concentrated work by Artsource on developing and promoting the "Percent for Art Policy for Local Government" over the last two years has led to an increase in commissioning of works, and remains one of the largest employers of artists with 23 projects in 2008. stage will lead to more meaningful and satisfying public spaces. It is therefore gratifying that artists Tom Muller and Jon Tarry were engaged by Mirvac and Banksia Grove respectively to assist with the long term planning for and creation of public art in property developments.

The Percent for Art policies of Local Government and redevelopment authorities encourage developers to seek specialist advice when engaging an artist and selecting work for developments.

Artsource provides training assistance and support for Local Government staff in Public Art Policy development, implementation and master planning for public art. This is particularly valuable given the dynamic state of staff in Local Government and increased demands on staff roles and responsibilities. In 2008 Artsource provided support and guidance in order to train staff at the Town of Victoria Park as they sought to commission new works for the Town. Artsource worked closely with staff and the community to establish a process for procuring public art.

In 2008 Artsource developed a suite of new services to assist clients in finding artists and developing good projects. Representation of artist members' work occurred through our presentations to new and existing public art and leasing clients. The Women in Property committee of the Urban Development Institute of Australia, invited Artsource to deliver a presentation on public art at the Art Gallery of WA.

Artsource continued its partnership with the Town of Busselton facilitating artist engagement in precinct planning for the Entry Precinct to Busselton. Much of the material provided by the artist team of Alex Mickle, Perdita Phillips and Lance Chadd assisted in setting themes and colour palettes for the town's CBD. ^①

Membership + Public Programs

As a membership organisation, the achievements of our members and our ability to satisfy them are the keystone of our existence and our success.

ver the last year 138 of our members exhibited their work, 59 members achieved various grants and awards, while 41 achieved public art commissions. 11 artists won residencies at state, national and international venues.

Artsource assists its members through three tiers of membership – each one designed to best fit their varied needs.

ACCESS provides visual arts information, support, networking, professional development, advocacy, membership voting rights and access to resources and discounts.

PLUS membership provides real income earning opportunities and a continual profile on our online Artist Database on top of the ACCESS benefits.

MAX adds \$10million public liability insurance and free workshops to the full package of ACCESS and PLUS benefits.

Public Program 2008

The Employment Agency enhances its activities with a public program of professional development training opportunities, fora and workshops geared to building artistic, business and commercial knowledge, suitable for both artists and clients (see p 20 for the full list).

In 2008 Artsource delivered 24 professional development workshops and events to over 1000 members and other participants. Our public program focussed on assisting our membership to understand and achieve funding; learn about developing relationships with gallery managers, critics and collectors; gain an insight into various industry processes and products and, particularly in remote regional WA, gain access to artists with specialised skill sets.

We also invited freelance writer Anne Sanders to meet a number of artists in their studios with the view of gaining more reviews of WA artists in national magazines. Her visit resulted in a feature on four WA artists in *Artist Profile*'s Autumn edition covering: Jon Tarry, Judith Forrest, Mike Singe and Eveline Kotai.




