Corine has been a Board member since 2012.

Miik Green

Miik is a Western Australian artist and researcher, whose practice extends over 20 years. Miik draws inspiration from the microscopic aspects of nature, and is interested

in cross-disciplinary initiatives that involve the fields of art, science, mathematics, chemistry and physics. His work is represented in major collections nationally and private collections overseas. He is currently focused on creating new opportunities for Perth-based artists.Miik is currently a PhD candidate at Curtin University of Technology. He is represented by Stella Downer Fine Art (NSW), Flinders Lane Gallery (VIC) and Linton & Kay Contemporary (WA). Miik is an Artsource Patron and has been a Board member since 2013.

Paola Anselmi

Paola is a Perth-based visual arts and public art curator and arts writer. Paola is a regular contributor to Australian arts publications and has published numerous



exhibition catalogue essays. Over 25 years she has held curatorial and research roles at the Art Gallery of WA (1989-96), Royal Perth Hospital Art Collection (1996-06), Centre for Contemporary Art, Luigi Pecci, Prato, curated a number of exhibitions as a freelance Curator and undertaken public and private collection development and public art projects. Paola has served on the Mark Howlett Foundation board (2000-10), the Art Angels Inc. (2000-11), Museums Australia, WA (1993-99) and the Royal Perth Hospital Art Committee (2007-13). Paola has been a Board member since 2013.

Olga Cironis

(until May 2013) Olga is a well respected and established West Australian artist, teacher and lecturer with a practice that spans over 20 years. She holds a



Masters of Visual Arts from University of Sydney and has exhibited nationally and internationally, in commercial and artist run gallery spaces. Olga has worked in remote communities in Western Australia, coordinating art projects that encourage links with other art groups and communities. She has instigated and collaborated in art projects in PNG and East Timor. She has completed a number of public art works in WA and Italy and enjoys sharing her experiences and knowledge. Olga's work is represented nationally and internationally in public and private collections. Olga was a Board member from May 2011 to May 2013.

Penny Coss

(until May 2013) Penny is predominantly a painter. Over 20 years, her practice has included developing local, national and international opportunities;



representations in collaborations and individual forms; exhibiting in public and commercial galleries; lecturing and teaching; working in community and public art projects; and Artist Run Initiatives. Penny was a Board member from May 2011 to May 2013.

David Doepel

(until May 2013) David was brought up in Perth, studied and worked in the USA and returned to Western Australia in 2008. David was previously the Director of the Research



Institute for Resource Technology at Murdoch University, served as a Principal Policy Adviser to the Hon. Alan Carpenter, Premier of Western Australia and as Regional Director for the Americas, for the Western Australian Trade and Investment Office. David is an Artsource Patron and was a Board member from May 2009 to May 2013.





Chair's Report

During 2013 Artsource successfully delivered on the second year of our current strategic plan and recorded a number of significant achievements in this, the first full year under the leadership of our new Chief Executive Officer, Gavin Buckley.



Chief among these were a number of important strategic decisions that have set the scene for a dynamic 2014, the final year of our plan.

In particular I would like to highlight to our members and stakeholders:

- The renewal of a key partnership with Rio Tinto that ensures the continuing development of our Regional and Indigenous program in the Pilbara for the next three years;
- The launch of a new Patrons Program and the successful initial fundraising campaign that attracted matching Commonwealth funding and is now enabling us to create development capacity within the organisation;
- The introduction of our new and much improved website;
- The negotiation of a significant research project into future studio needs and opportunities for visual artists in Perth, which is being funded by the Department of Culture and Arts;
- A leadership role in developing a feasibility study, funded by Lotterywest, for a major new visual arts event for Western Australia;
- An ongoing focus on our successful consulting operations to ensure we deliver best-practice and meet the needs of our members and stakeholders;
- The consolidation of our team into one office in Fremantle to ensure a unified approach to our interactions with members and stakeholders;
- A restructuring of staff roles and positions to suit the needs of the organisation for the remainder of our current strategic plan and beyond.

During 2014 a number of these achievements will continue to deliver benefits to Artsource and our members. They will also play an increasing part in creating an environment in which the Board can confidently look forward three years to develop our new strategic plan for 2015-17 aligned with the needs of visual artists in Western Australia.

Our next strategic plan will focus not only on how we deliver professional services for visual artists, but also, on how we can play a increasing role in contributing to a cultural environment in Western Australia where there is a strong interest in and demand for visual art and where our members can flourish.

I would like to thank all members of the Board for dedicating significant time and energy during the year to the continuing development of Artsource.

In particular, I would like to acknowledge the valuable input of Penny Coss, Olga Cironis and David Doepel, each of whom completed their term as a Board member during the year.

Finally, on the behalf of the Board, my thanks to all the staff, members and supporters who help to make Artsource the leading organisation for visual artists in Western Australia.

Chief Executive's Report

It has been a busy year of change, building partnerships and delivering services for members. We successfully achieved the second year of the current three-year plan and ended the year with a small financial surplus.



In April I was pleased to see our new website launched and receive much positive feedback from members and many others. The previous website had been static for some time and, from the moment it was launched, we took full advantage of the dynamic capabilities of the new platform. Development of the interactive online database was a complex undertaking and took longer than initially planned, however, as I write, all PLUS and MAX members have their logon details and are building their online profiles and uploading images. Passing this milestone allows us to now develop additional functions and more content for the website.

We renewed and extended our strategic partnership with Rio Tinto for a further three years. Since 2008, we have been working successfully with Rio Tinto to deliver a development program for regional and Indigenous visual artists in the Pilbara. This fresh partnership allows us to build on the work undertaken to date, focused in the Shires of Roebourne and Ashburton.

Two new Artsource studio complexes opened in 2013. Douglas Street Studios opened in Leederville, accommodating many of the artists who had previously been in our shortterm studios at The Ward and, in North Perth, we opened a further eight studios above the Rosemount Hotel. This partnership with the famous entertainment venue brings the total number of Artsource studios to 82 across the metropolitan area.

Projects managed by Artsource Consulting delivered \$993,494 and, through ArtLease, a further \$40,646 in fees for artists. During the year we updated and improved our contracts, processes and procedures and we are now undertaking an independent review of our consulting operations, recognising where we are already delivering best practice and recommending where and how further improvements can be made.

I was delighted that we were able to offer five emerging artists grants to help further develop their practice and take their career another step forward. With the financial support of the Department of Culture and the Arts' Philanthropy Incentive Program, we worked with the Constantine Family Foundation to deliver this exciting initiative. To deliver services for members Artsource raises money from a variety of sources. We launched a refreshed Patrons program and were successful in applying to Creative Partnerships Australia for a \$30,000 'Plus1' matching grant, helping us build our capacity for the future. I am immensely grateful to the Constantine Family Foundation and all the patrons and donors who supported Artsource and the Plus1 Appeal in 2013 allowing us to secure this valuable matching grant. It has been clear for some time that if we are to do more for members we must focus on fundraising. Building and maintaining relationships with sponsors, patrons and donors takes skill and time and, in December, we restructured the team to ensure that we have someone dedicated to the task in 2014 and beyond. Of course, it's not just about money, it is about relationships and how we can engage more people and enthuse them about the art and artists of Western Australia.

Earlier in the year we also restructured our Membership Services team and integrated our regional and Indigenous work into one team lead by one manager. We reduced the Leadership Team down to the right size and moved the Consulting team to Fremantle where everyone now benefits from working together in the same office. Much was achieved in 2013 and I would like to thank everyone in the team for their hard work and commitment to delivering the best we can for Artsource members.

Indeed it is our members who are at the heart of everything we do and, as we shape our new strategic plan for 2015-2017, this fact is front and centre in our thinking.

Membership Services

Artsource is Western Australia's peak membership body for visual artists. We have around 900 members whom we provide with practical and relevant support to help them maintain and grow their professional practice.

Artsource supports visual artists in many ways, including by

- connecting artists to employment opportunities and relevant professional resources;
- offering advice and a variety of professional development opportunities;
- Providing up-to-date information to ensure members are aware of current industry news and opportunities.

Our artist members

Artsource members are active across all levels of a professional visual arts practice. They pursue local, national and international exhibition opportunities; take part in local, national and international residencies; compete in a wide variety of prizes; win a broad range of commissions and take part in numerous conferences and educational opportunities.

During 2013, members submitted news of over 300 exhibitions, awards, grants, commissions and other events to our Newsletters and fortnightly e-zines, which, in part, celebrate and promote their work.

Graduate members

Artsource presented to graduates at the Central Institute of Technology, Curtin and Edith Cowan Universities. We give each graduate a free 12-month ACCESS membership to help them get to know us and to access our services as they begin their careers. We also give an annual Industry Award to one graduate from each institution who is considered to be most ready to take advantage of professional employment opportunities.

Information, advocacy + advice

Artsource provides information and guidance for members who are negotiating the business side of their professional visual art practice. These queries range from how to approach agents or galleries, where to go for funding and support and how to get appropriate advice on legal, business, insurance, tax and accounting issues.

We also provide referrals to expertise and resources. To achieve this we work with a variety of respected local and national organisations to assist our members. For example, artist members are regularly referred to The Arts Law Centre of Australia for legal advice on copyright and moral rights issues and to the National Association for the Visual Arts for help to appropriately value their work and determine fees for their professional services.

Member communications

Our members rely on regular updates from Artsource about the many opportunities available for Western Australian artists. We continue to provide information to members through fortnightly member ezines and printed newsletters three times each year. Weekly employment and commission opportunities are distributed to all PLUS and MAX members. Our new website was launched in early 2013 and gave us the dynamic promotional tool to keep members up-to-date with current activities.

Professional development + networking

Artsource provides practical and relevant professional development opportunities and, in 2013, over 300 members participated in Artsource professional development and networking events. These included a seminar and one-on-one sessions with our insurance broker, a seminar on raising funds from the private sector, a forum dealing with Wills, an illustration workshop in Tom Price and four 6x6 Artist Talks in Fremantle, Midland, Cossack and Kwinana.

Mentor grants

Our new mentor support program for emerging artists was introduced in 2013. This was funded through the Department of Culture and the Arts Philanthropy Incentive program, courtesy of the Constantine Family Foundation.

The mentor grants targeted two areas:

- Support for emerging artists to take the next step in their professional practice by undertaking a developmental activity to assist in the journey or take a risk on a new venture, project or path.
- Funded travel assistance for regional members to attend Perth-based Artsource events.



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Regional + Indigenous Development

Our Regional and Indigenous Development program aims to support artists across the State. We have a grassroots approach offering artists the opportunity to identify and develop their own needs from within their own communities.

Artsource helps artists in remote, regional and Indigenous communities connect with professional contemporary visual arts opportunities available in metropolitan Perth and elsewhere.

Our members work across the State, Australia and around the world. This extensive and varied membership-base allows us to connect with a wide range of visual arts expertise and professional experience across nearly all areas and mediums of professional visual arts practice.

We connect our members to a range of other arts professionals including curators, arts consultants, gallery owners, institutions and other artist representative bodies, such as the Arts Law Centre of Australia and the Copyright Agency.

Our services include:

- Promotion of job opportunities for artists – commissions, art projects, competitions, awards.
- Workshops offering professional and skills development.
- Artist exchanges to and from regional areas.
- Mentoring from senior artists and practitioners, curators and business people.
- Introductions to industry professionals, galleries, curators, institutions and service providers.

Rio Tinto

We were delighted to renew our partnership with Rio Tinto for another three years. Rio Tinto's commitment to the visual arts in the Shire of Roebourne and the western part of the Shire of Ashburton is a great example of a company working with us to support local artists separated by circumstance, or distance, from professional arts opportunities. Over the next three years Artsource will build on our work in the Pilbara around the art centres in Roebourne and support other individual artists pursuing their practice in the surrounding areas of Karratha, Dampier and Wickham.

The support that Rio Tinto and Artsource together provide for artists in the Pilbara highlights the possibilities and benefits of investment in locally developed art and culture.

Professional Development in Regional WA

Our 6x6 artist presentations – where six artists present their practice for six minutes – provide an opportunity for regional artists to tell others in their community about what they do. Each 6x6 session can have a theme, deliver to a specific audience, or simply allow artists to gather, discuss and appreciate each other's work.

Regional artists can get little opportunity to professionally present their arts practices to others. During the year Artsource worked with the Shire of Roebourne to present their first 6x6 presentation as part of the Shire's public program and in association with their Cossack Art Awards. This was a resounding success. Not only did this event act as an excellent precursor to the Cossack Art Award; highlighting local arts practices and the professionalism of those artists pursuing an arts practice in the area, but also it offered the visiting art award judges – Seva Frangos and Lindy Lee – the opportunity to reflect and comment on the level to which artists were committed to their arts practice in a mining town as young as Karratha.

The City of Kwinana and Artsource worked together to deliver our first Indigenous 6x6 artist presentation. Denien Toomath, Deborah Bonar, Barbara Bynder, Vanessa Russ, and Sharyn Egan presented, with the aim of exploring the twodimensional works found in the South West of Western Austrlaia. Rio Tinto also hosted an Illustration workshop in Tom Price for Indigenous community members. We partnered with Magabala Books in Broome – the oldest Indigenous owned publishing house in Australia – to introduce local artists to the possibilities of sharing and capturing community stories through illustration and the spoken word. Community members hope to build on this opportunity and have the opportunity to develop a direct relationship with Magabala Books.

Other Highlights

- Working with the Aboriginal Health Council of Western Australia, we assisted in the selection of Turid Calgaret, an emerging Noongar artist, who secured her first private commission to develop a public artwork and design for their company logo and entrance statement. Artsource also helped Princess Margaret Hospital in appointing Turid to the Bentley Adolescent Unit as artist-inresidence coordinator.
- Artsource was pleased to see two Indigenous artists move into our studios. Sharyn Egan is now working in the Rosemount Hotel studios and Katie West has one of our studios in Fremantle.
- We worked alongside Helen Clarke to develop an artist residency that built on the visit of a Finnish curator to Western Australia. Helen successfully self-funded her own proposal through support from Artsource and will travel to Finland in 2014 for her sixweek residency.
- Our Membership and Indigenous Development Manager, Ron Bradfield, was successful in applying for the highly respected ACCELERATE program run by the British Council in Australia.

Studios

Artsource studios offer fundamental support for artists by providing essential workspaces. Our studios are secure, affordable and professional spaces occupied by a wide-range of practising contemporary artists.

Through our studios we aim to ensure that artists remain an active part of our communities and that they aren't hindered by ever-increasing rents and city gentrification.

By the close of 2013, Artsource was managing 82 individual studios spaces in eight buildings across the metropolitan area. With increased demand from our members for studios, our development work included seeking partnerships with commercial landlords to activate buildings to be new studio complexes and assisting members to negotiate affordable spaces from private owners, such as the magnificent building on Hannon Street in Kalgoorlie for a regional member.

Artsource Fremantle Studios

Our landmark building in Fremantle provides 25 working spaces to artists over a five-year tenure. Spaces are highly sought after with applications open to members in January each year and assessments undertaken by a panel of artist members. Since the building was repurposed in 1987 over 200 artists have benefitted from a studio space here.

Artsource Midland Studios

The 18 studios in the Artsource Midland complex inhabit a former boarding house and include a shop-front space operating as an artist-runinitiative. While the artists work independently in their individual studios the collective nature of the building has proved advantageous with evidence of increased confidence in emerging artists; the maturing of ideas; opportunities for exhibitions and collaborations and exposure to peer feedback.

Haig Park Studios, East Perth

This Foundation Housing accommodation complex in East Perth was developed in 2001 with four built-in studios. This innovative approach includes residential apartments for two studio artists that meet low-income eligibility criteria.

New Studios: Douglas Street Studios, Leederville

Building on the success of The Ward studio complex, developed over 13 months in a former maternity hospital in Leederville, Artsource took on another building in the area when the owners sold The Ward. The new building accommodated twelve artists moving across from The Ward who were joined by a new group of artists to fill the twenty spaces available.

The Leederville studio projects were significant milestones for Artsource. We developed new connections with recent graduates, provided secure spaces for established artists and were able to link with differing creative allies to start new collaborative opportunities.

New Studios: Rosemount Hotel Studios, North Perth

In November, Artsource revitalised eight storage rooms above the Rosemount Hotel in North Perth. This visionary partnership with the wellloved independent music venue is a welcome addition to our portfolio, offering more central city spaces to our membership, with the added bonus of five-year tenure.

Other Studios

We continued our partnership with the Metropolitan Redevelopment Authority using a house and two large sheds on a property in Kelmscott as artists' spaces.

Some long-term studio partnerships came to an end in 2013. The Garvey Park studios were handed back to the City of Belmont, the Amherst Street studio site was vacated to make way for development and the Settlers Cottage site in Churchlands was passed to Hannah's House Foundation, who plan to build a children's respite centre.

Residencies

Artsource Residencies acknowledge the importance of global experiences to an artist's developing practice and career.

Through well-developed residency initiatives, Artsource supports Western Australian artists providing travel opportunities that offer a change to normal routines and allow focused time for art practice development.

Artsource Basel Exchange Residency, Switzerland

Basel is regarded as the one of the most important cultural centres in the region. This residency partnership with European cultural institute the Christoph Merian Foundation has offered artists from both countries the opportunity to enrich and develop their art practices since 1989. Through a selection process a Western Australian artist is chosen to undertake the residency and is supported with a \$28,000 grant from the Department of Culture and the Arts. In June 2013, Artsource member Minaxi May undertook the sixmonth residency in Switzerland and was able to experience other areas in Europe from this base.

In exchange, Jochen Kitzbihler, arrived in February from the Black Forrest in Germany. Jochen quickly became engaged in the fabric of the art community in Perth, making connections with a number of Artsource members, participating in artist talks and exhibitions and building strong relationships for future collaborations.

Artsource Artspace Residency, Sydney

Artsource has offered this residency since 1995 and it remains an important part of our residency portfolio. In 2013 this residency was awarded to Simone Johnston who spent October to December in Sydney, making connections and developing ideas for new work. This residency was supported with a \$7,500 grant from the Department of Culture and the Arts. "Since returning to Fremantle I have been sorting through my experiences and reorientating myself back into life at home. I feel refreshed and looking forward to being in the studio. I feel like I have a wealth of ideas to draw on which will feed my practice for the foreseeable future. The manner in which residencies take you out of your comfort zone and become a memorable event in one's life allow for a stopping and restart of one's practice."

Artsource Go Anywhere

Two artists were able to bring their *Go Anywhere* residency to fruition in 2013, with grants from Artsource of \$10,000 each. The money was raised from the generous donations of Artsource Patrons in 2012 and the artists applied to undertake their own residency opportunity with this support.

Trevor Richards was artist in residence at the *Cité Internationale des Artes* in Paris, France from May to June.

Artsource Lifetime Achievement Award recipient Hans Arkeveld stretched his grant through seven countries, with stops in Paris, Florence, Padua, Berlin, Amsterdam and the United Kingdom.

The *Go Anywhere* residency initiative is reliant on support from Artsource Patrons and donors and we hope to develop this further in coming years.

Artsource Fremantle Residency

As well as making international residency opportunities available for Western Australian artists, Artsource reciprocates by making our Fremantle studio apartment available for visiting regional, national and international artists.

Capricorn Yanchep Residency

A new initiative and partnership through Capricorn Joint Venture allowed us to run two residencies in Yanchep. In March, Kirsten Biven spent four weeks working with the community, followed by Wendy Lugg in November. The artists were accommodated at Capricorn House and Capricorn Joint Venture supported the project financially.

Artsource Consulting

Artsource Consulting connects artists with income earning opportunities, providing a single point of access to visual culture for developers, builders, architects, interior designers and local government.

We do this by working with the business sector for the purpose of engaging artists in paid work. This work covers a broad range of activity and can include public art projects with budgets from \$25,000 to \$500,000; artist-in-residences at schools, hospitals or other institutions; private art commissions; running workshops; community projects; curatorial, adjudication or other professional opportunities; plus leasing or purchase of artwork.

When working with business, Artsource Consulting works to develop projects with both artistic integrity and proper remuneration . We also promote and advocate for processes that are fair to artists. Indeed, during the year we reviewed and updated our own processes and contracts. We will also commission an independent assessment to check these improvements and, if necessary, make further changes to ensure that we are operating as clearly and as transparently as possible.

The primary focus in our work in 2013 was capacity building through project management, which has the most tangible employment and economic outcomes for artists. We managed 52 projects throughout Western Australia with a total commission value of \$2,620,942 (some projects run over several years); artist fees in 2013 were \$1,034,140.

Highlighted below are three projects that demonstrate the range of our activities. A table of all current projects in 2013 is shown on page 30.

Port Coogee Indigenous Public Art

Artsource worked with the City of Cockburn Indigenous reference group on the Port Coogee, Australand development. Aboriginal artists Wendy Hayden and Deborah Bonar formed a team with Kidogo Art Institute's director Joanna Robertson to create a series of brightly-coloured ceramic glass public artworks, installed in parks at Port Coogee. Each represents an interpretive story about the Noongar people and their movement through the local Beeliar wetlands in the past and the present. The artworks were well received and the project achieved significant community acceptance and engagement. Members of the Noongar community were pleased to see the stories bringing people together and providing a way to reconnect with the parkland development.

2013 Telethon Appeal

Perth Public Art Foundation approached Artsource to develop, facilitate and oversee artwork commissioning, artists' workshops and artwork installation at the 2013 Telethon Appeal. This multi-faceted project had the broad aim to engage and pay professionally recognised artists, experienced in producing large scale sculptural works and in working with children, for the benefit of the Telethon Appeal. Importantly, it aimed to positively impact the lives of children experiencing ill health. Artists Olga Cironis, Paula Hart and Denise Brown produced a series of six large-scale artworks, four medium-scale and 12 small-scale artworks; a series of workshops for children and a number of activities for the Telethon Weekend. The finished artworks were auctioned for almost \$30,000, with the proceeds going to the Telethon Appeal. A research report documented the positive effects of creativity and art practice on children with ill health.

Wade Street Monument of Gratitude, Northbridge, Western Australia

The WA Vietnamese Community worked with Artsource to commission a public artwork commemorating the relocation of Vietnamese people in 1975. The monument expresses the community's gratitude to the people of Western Australia for accepting and resettling Vietnamese people as they fled Vietnam by boat after the fall of Saigon. Artist Coral Lowry worked closely with Dr Nguyen and his committee to design an artwork that reflected their story, using contemporary aesthetics with identifiably Vietnamese imagery. The tilting boat represents the vulnerability and danger faced by many on the open seas. The base of the artwork is inspired by the traditional Dong Son drum. The alignment of the work in the Northbridge park site is symbolic also, as it sits roughly north-south to represent Vietnam to the north and the southward journey to Australia. The sculpture was unveiled in late October 2013 at a moving ceremony which marked one year of planning and fundraising by the Vietnamese community of Western Australia.

Regional

Capacity building is particularly important in our project management in Regional WA. All regional projects include some aspect of skills or professional development training for local artists or arts workers.

- Working with Karratha-based project partners Archipelago Arts, we managed the Cossack Art Awards for the fourth consecutive year.
- Our advocacy work in 2012 in the Gascoyne region resulted in a contract to develop a comprehensive public art strategy for the Gascoyne.
- We curated the inaugural exhibition in the newly built Carnarvon Library and Art Gallery, including professional development sessions for local community members in artwork handling and hanging.
- Stage one of a two-part public art project was installed in Bridgetown, supported by a bequest made to Artsource by the Henry Schapper Foundation. Sydney artist Damien Butler worked with local fabricators to build capacity in the local community. Stage two will be delivered in 2014 by artists from the local community.
- Artsource was engaged by the Shire of Esperance to develop a Public Art Strategy for a new waterfront development, focused on local themes and artistic practice.

Artlease

Our team of Art Consultants provide a unique service to help clients select artworks for their offices or homes. Artworks by Western Australian artists are available for lease or purchase. Our membership includes an extensive range of artists and we aim to find the right art to suit any space, budget and style.

In 2013, Artlease not only continued to generate a steady income (\$40,646 for 60 artist members), but also gained high profile exposure for artists by having their work represented in some key collections, many in the Perth CBD.

Private Commissions

Artsource continues to build relationships with private collectors and promotes site specific artwork commissioning for interior spaces. The Subiaco FJM Commissions by long-time Artsource supporter, Adrian Fini, are examples of such projects. Artists Brendan Van Hek and Penny Bovell were commissioned to produce works that complemented the building design. Van Hek's stunning artwork illuminates the entrance of the building. Bovell's beautiful abstract painting has been superimposed on the glass windows to the west wall. Bovell's work acts as peaceful privacy between the FJM Building and the neighbouring apartments, whilst Van Hek's work is a fun and playful attraction to the foyer to engage all patrons of the space.

Open Studios

Open studios provide an insight into the working lives of visual artists. In 2013 Artsource hosted open studio events at our Fremantle, Midland and Haig Park studios. We welcomed over 400 guests to our open studios events. They were able to meet artists, talk about their practice and see work in progress as well as finished artworks. Guests included politicians, collectors, philanthropists, business people and interested members of the public. They met and spoke with more than 60 emerging and established Western Australian artists. The events featured a diverse mix of artists, including painters, sculptors, ceramicists, video producers, photographers, illustrators, graphic designers and artists working across mixed media and installations. They shared their inspirations and stories and showcased a wide range of artworks at all stages of creation.






























Fundraising

Developing partnerships with patrons, donors and sponsors enables us to provide vital services and opportunities for artists.

Patrons

We launched a refreshed patrons program to help excite and encourage more people to get involved as active and valued participants in our work. The scheme provides a way for individuals to support us with an affordable monthly, or annual, donation and during the year more than 35 new patrons joined us. We thank them all for their support and look forward to welcoming more new patrons in the years ahead.

Making a difference


Patrons support us by making a regular tax-deductible donation, which we use to benefit artists and the visual arts in Western Australia.

- Platinum Patrons: \$1,000 annually, or \$80/month
- Gold Patrons: \$625 annually, or \$50/month
- Silver Patrons: \$375 annually, or \$30/month

Plus1 Appeal

We were successful in applying to Creative Partnerships Australia's new Plus1 scheme. Thanks to the support of over 80 donors we were able to raise \$30,000 in just ten weeks and this allowed us to claim the matching Plus1 grant to help us build our capacity to fundraise in future. This success allowed us to restructure our marketing and development activities giving us the dedicated skills, time and focus on nurturing our sponsors, patrons and donors. We are also investing in specialist software to support our fundraising. We thank everyone who contributed to the Plus1 campaign. Our particular thanks to the Constantine Family Foundation for their generous donation that got us to target by Christmas and just before the Plus1 scheme funds had been fully used up.



Finances



In this second year of our current three-year plan we had a particular focus on building the new website and fundraising. All other activity continued to deliver good and steady results. The key financial items and variations from 2012 include:

- Total turnover remained steady at \$1,984,173.
- There was a small surplus for the year of \$672; with equity increasing to \$78,347.
- The introduction of the Emerging Artists Mentor Program contributed to an increase in payments to artist through fees, commissions and grants – total \$683,863.
- Fee for Service income from our core activities continues to generate the majority of our income at \$1,338,180 – 68% of turnover.
- Our core-funding grant from the Department of Culture and the Arts (DCA) increased moderately to recognise inflation. This grant represents around 20% of our turnover.
- Our Australia Council grant to support international development was fully expended in 2012. The subsequent reduction in international activity is reflected in the decreased Consulting Project outgoings.

- We were delighted to renew our partnership with Rio Tinto for a further three years. This partnership supports the work of our Regional + Indigenous Development in the Pilbara.
- We introduced a refreshed patrons initiative and, at the end of 2013, a fundraising campaign was launched to raise \$30,000.
 In achieving our target, the funds were matched by a Plus1 grant from Creative Partnerships Australia.
- The development of the new website and artist online database is reflected in an increase in Governance & Administration expenditure.
- The reduction in international travel and also less travel through the Membership, Regional + Indigenous program in 2013 is reflected in the decreased Travel expenditure.
- Expenditure on salaries increased modestly to \$782,224. There were several staffing changes throughout 2013 and we go forward with 13 members of staff; seven full-time and six part-time (10.75 full-time equivalents).

The future

Our current level of activity is primarily funded through fee-for-service and DCA income, with some support from project grants and private sector partnerships. It is a healthy financial framework that we are not unduly reliant on one external funding source. The focus for 2014 is to increase partnerships with the private sector through donations and sponsorship. This has the potential to provide additional funds for us to meet growing demand for services and support new initiatives.


